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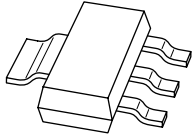

## 1. Product profile

### 1.1 General description

NPN low  $V_{CEsat}$  Breakthrough In Small Signal (BISS) transistor in a SOT223 (SC-73) small Surface-Mounted Device (SMD) plastic package.

PNP complement: PBSS305PZ.

### 1.2 Features

- Low collector-emitter saturation voltage  $V_{CEsat}$
- High collector current capability  $I_C$  and  $I_{CM}$
- High collector current gain ( $h_{FE}$ ) at high  $I_C$
- High efficiency due to less heat generation
- Smaller required Printed-Circuit Board (PCB) area than for conventional transistors

- High-voltage MOSFET gate driving
- High-voltage motor control

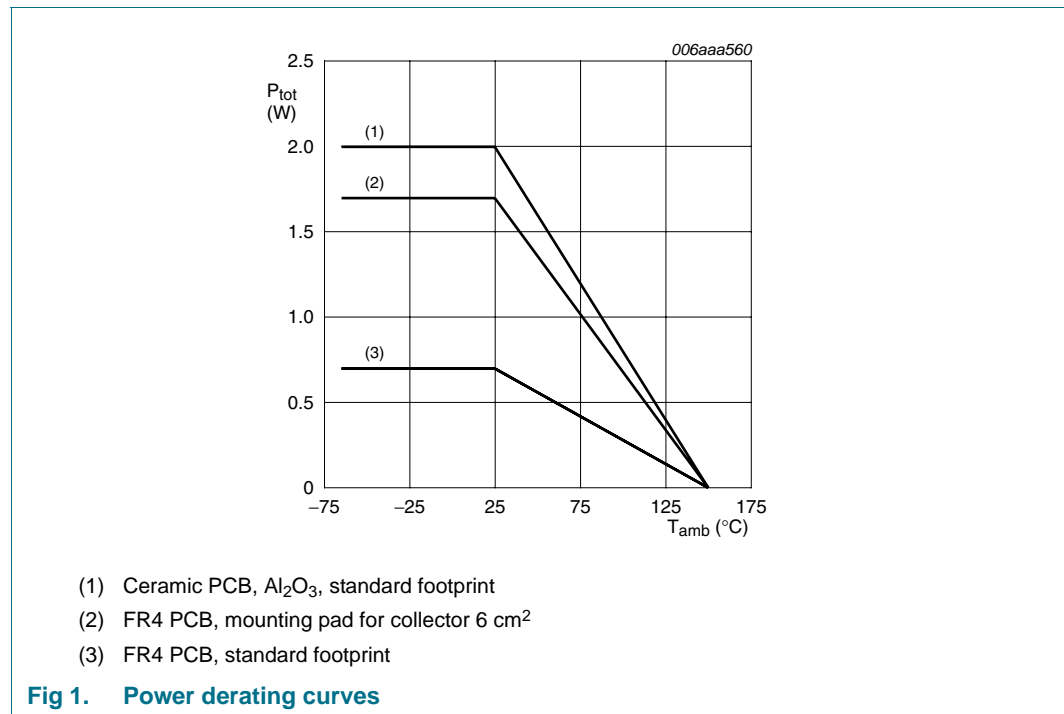

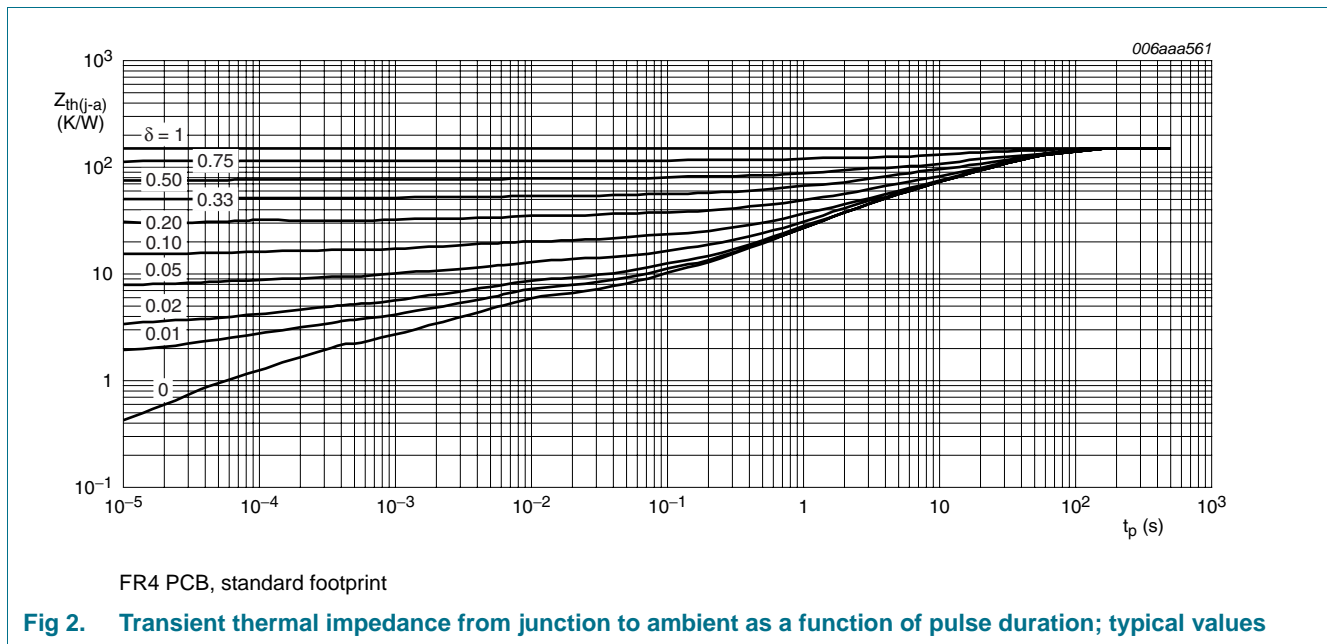

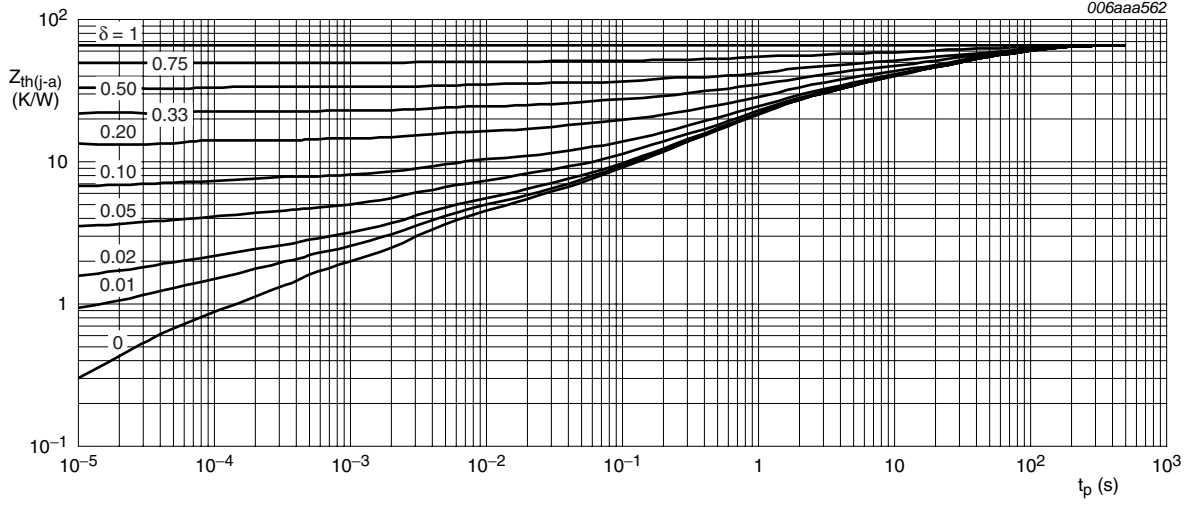


Fig 3. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values

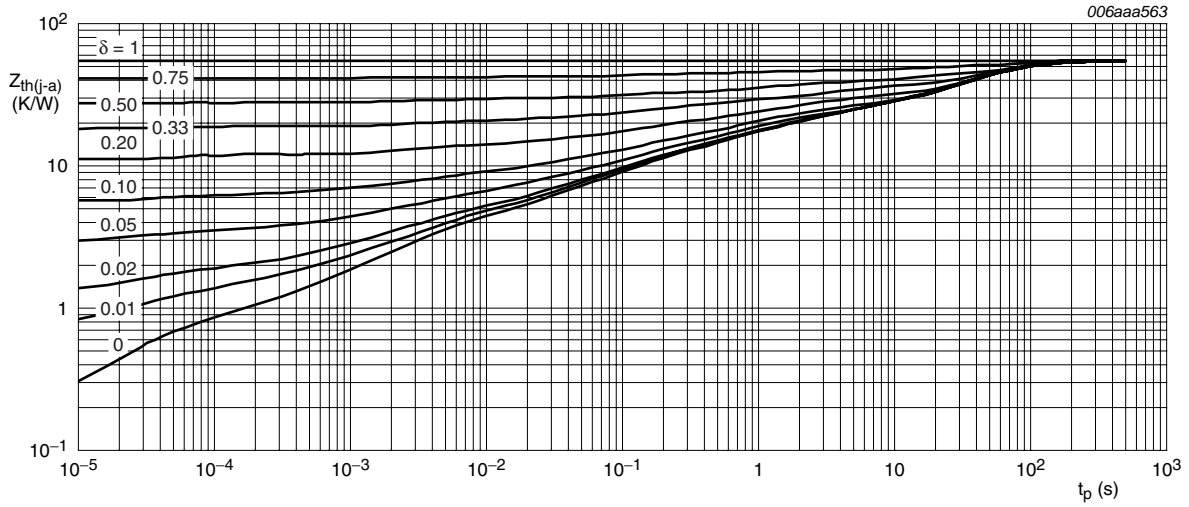


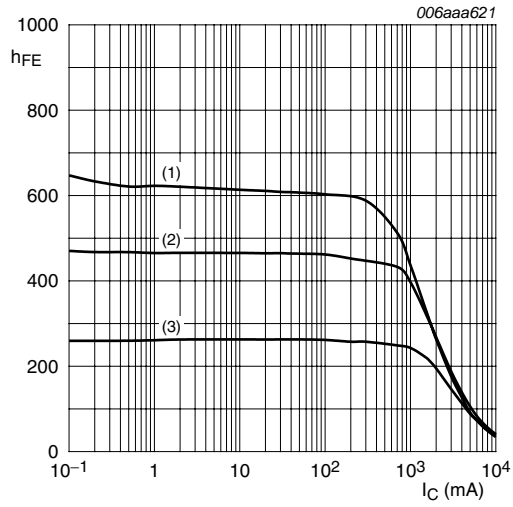
Fig 4. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values

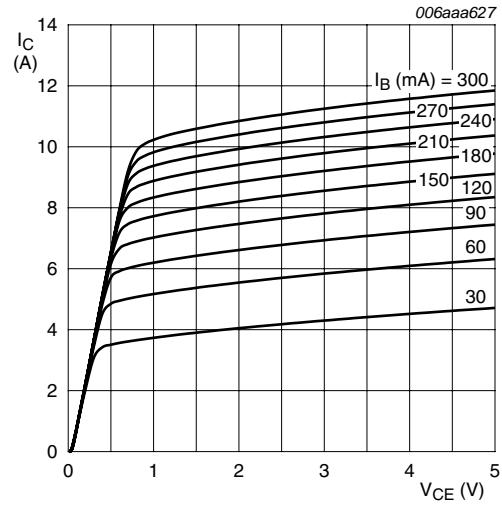

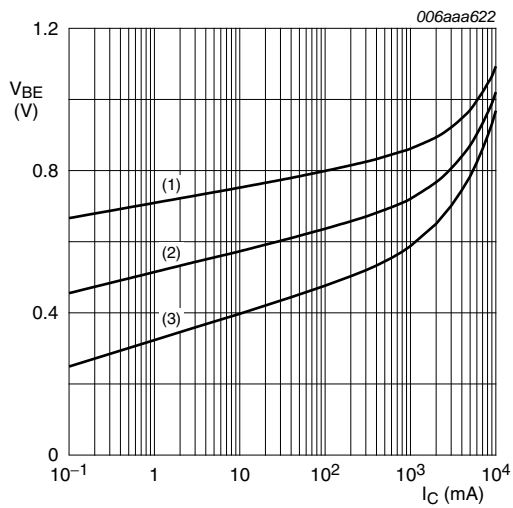

**Fig 5. DC current gain as a function of collector current; typical values**



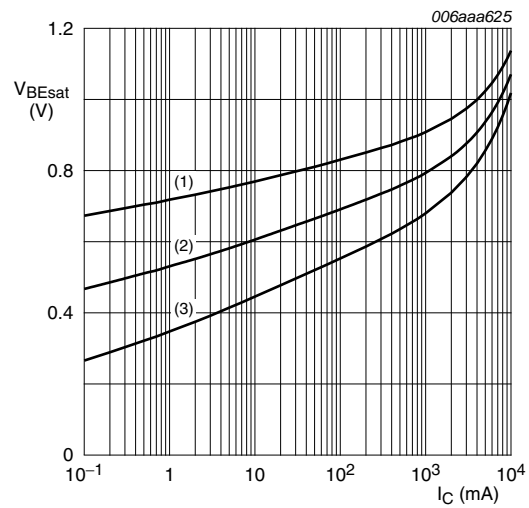

**Fig 6. Collector current as a function of collector-emitter voltage; typical values**



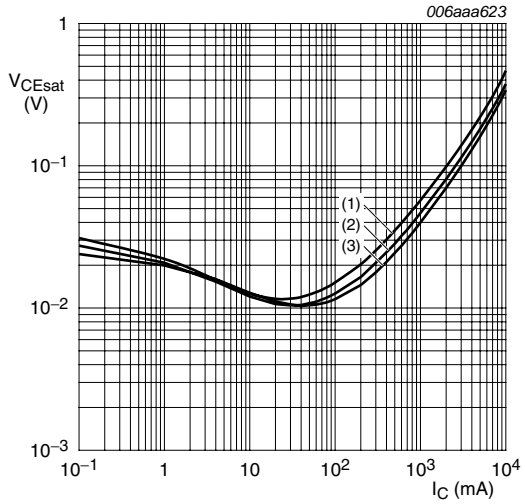

**Fig 7. Base-emitter voltage as a function of collector current; typical values**



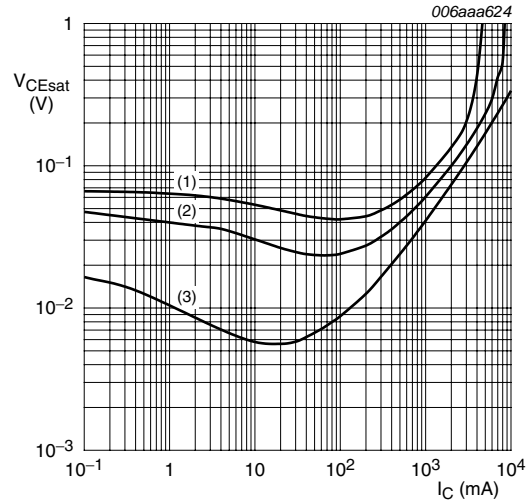

**Fig 8. Base-emitter saturation voltage as a function of collector current; typical values**



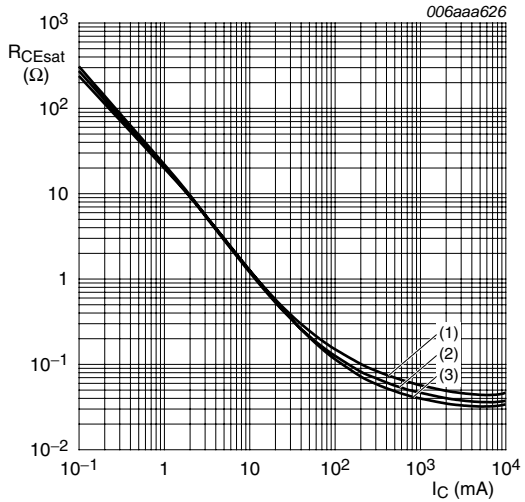

**Fig 9. Collector-emitter saturation voltage as a function of collector current; typical values**



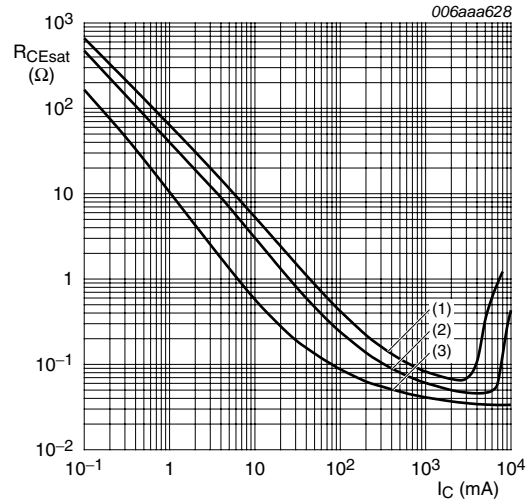

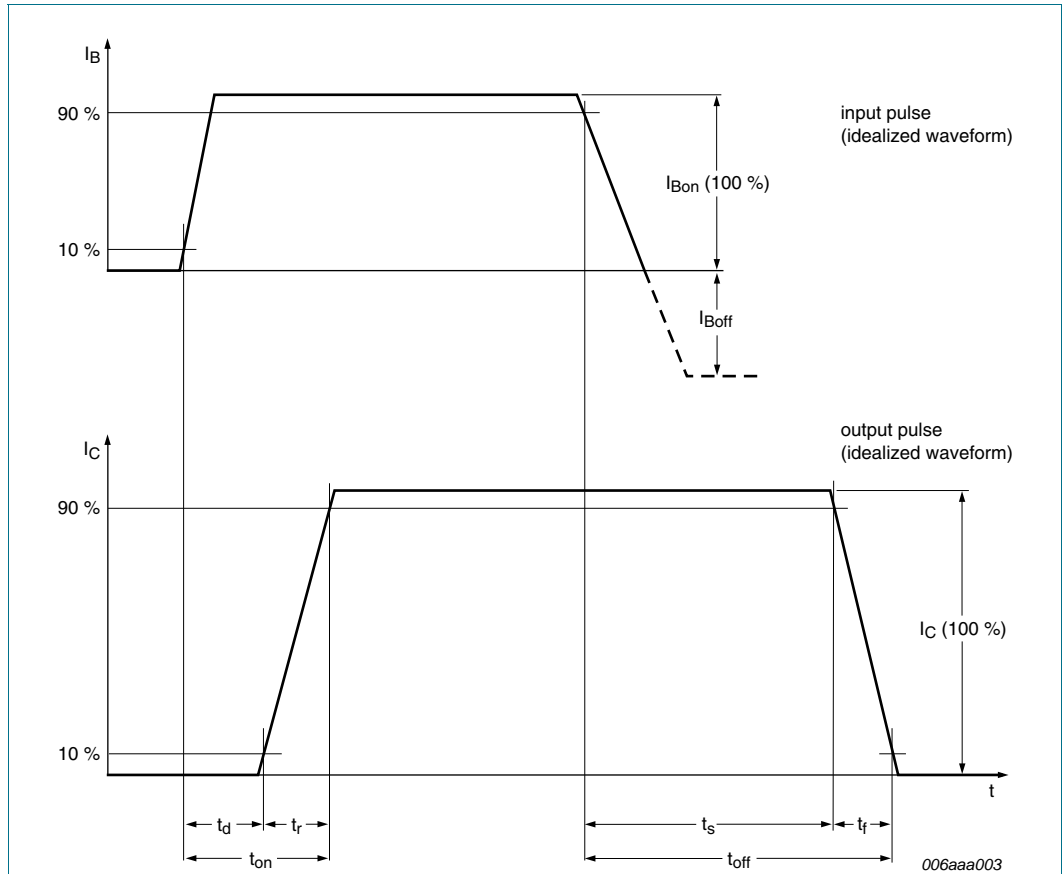
**Fig 11. Collector-emitter saturation resistance as a function of collector current; typical values**



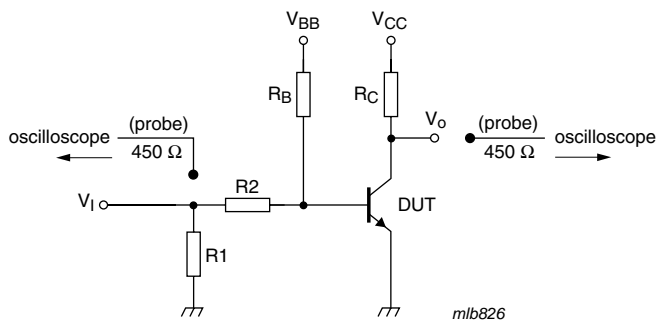

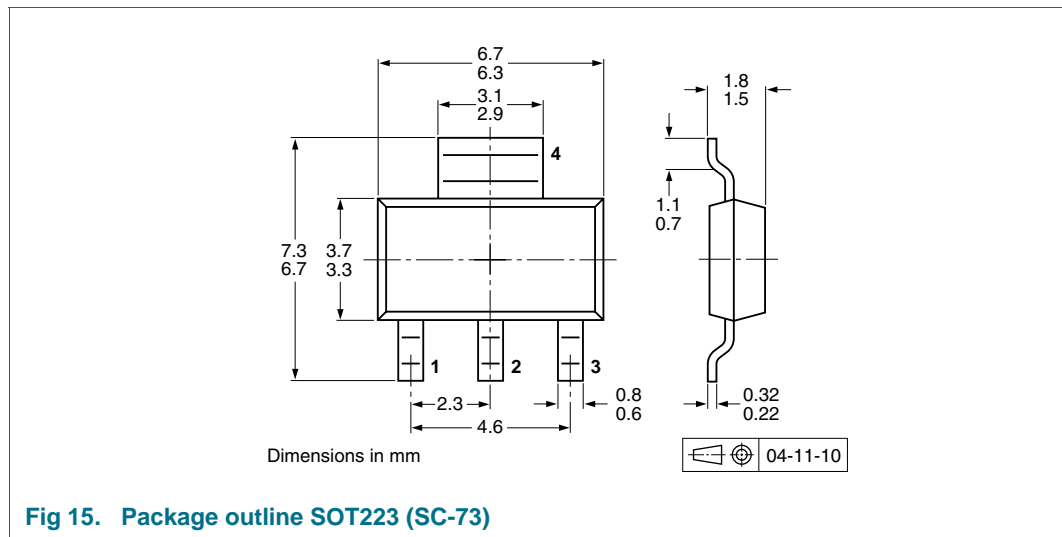
**Fig 13. BISS transistor switching time definition**

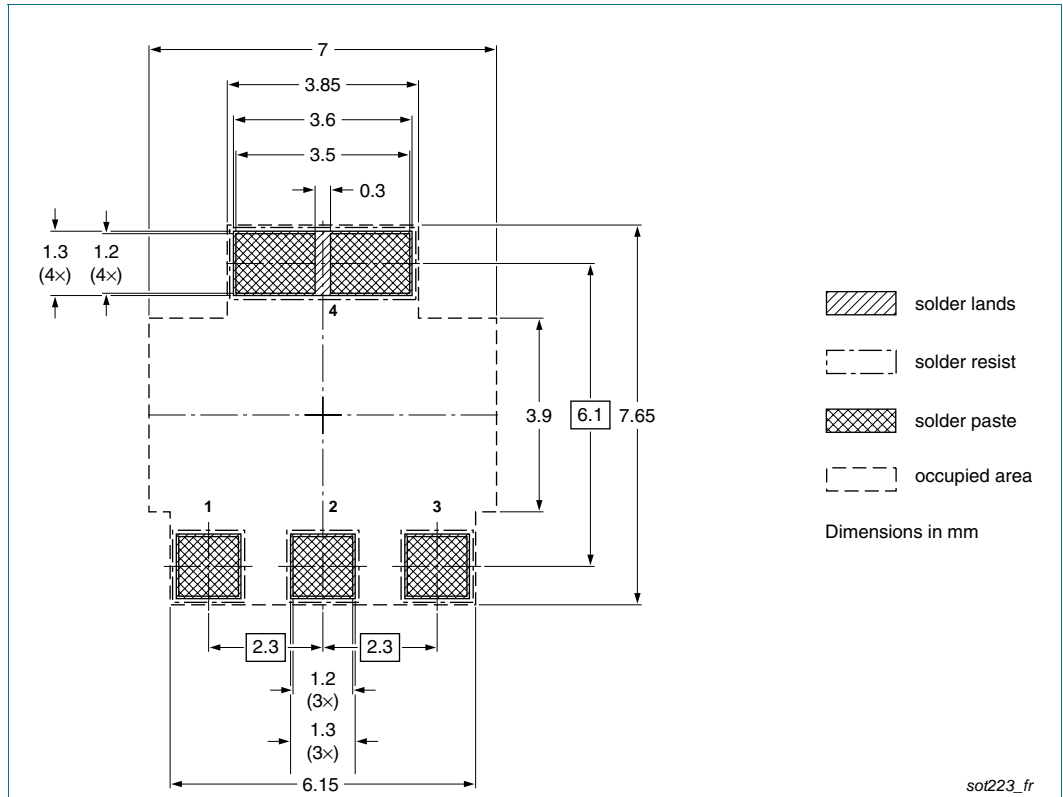

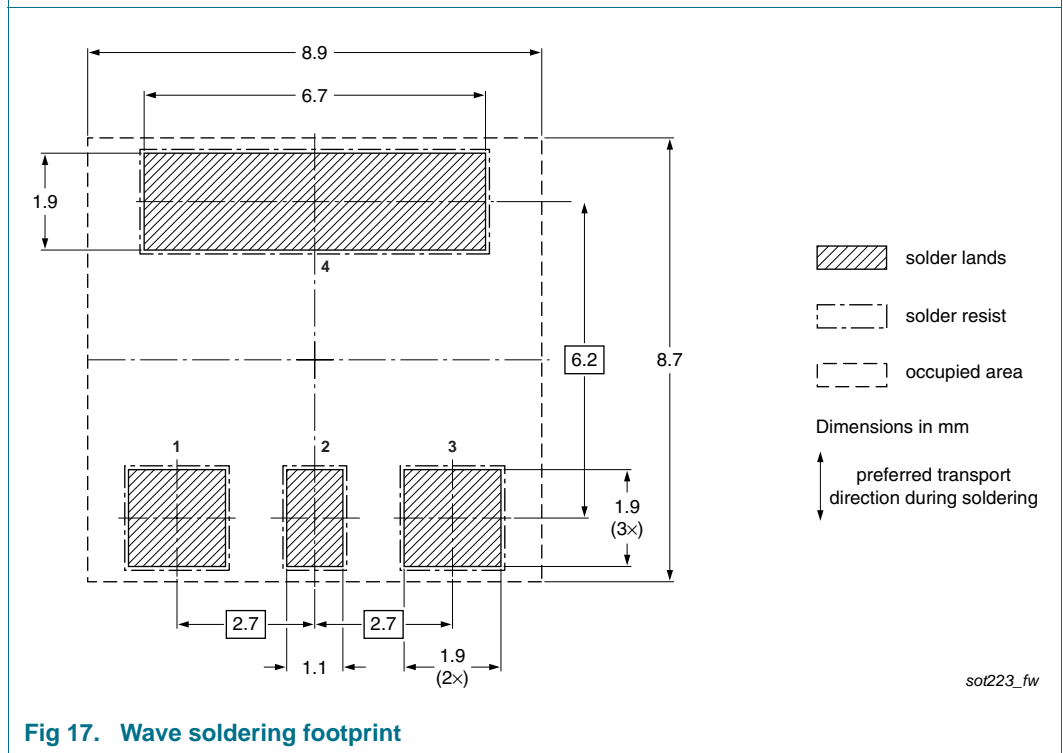
